Speaker: Carmel T Mooney MVB MPhil
PhD DECVIM-CA MRCVS

Overview:

This course will consist of some formal lectures and case-based presentations covering the most commonly diagnosed endocrine disorders. After an initial presentation on principles of diagnosing endocrine disease, the course will focus on the interpretation of tests for thyroid and adrenal gland dysfunction. The role of endocrine diseases in common presenting problems will be highlighted and there will be a focus on newer therapeutic regimens for hyperadrenocorticism and feline diabetes mellitus. The day will complete with case studies.

Speaker Biography:

Carmel is a UCD graduate who spent several years in Scotland where she completed both MPhil (The University of Edinburgh) and

PhD (The University of Glasgow) theses on feline hyperthyroidism. Following this she returned to UCD initially as Lecturer and now as Senior Lecturer in Small Animal Internal Medicine.

Carmel obtained the European Diploma in Veterinary Internal Medicine (Companion Animals) in 1998 and is also a RCVS recognised specialist in Small Animal Medicine (Endocrinology) which was awarded in recognition of her clinical and research work in the field of small animal endocrinology. She has been President of the British Small Animal Veterinary Association (2005-06) and is now Secretary of the European College of Veterinary Internal Medicine. She is heavily involved in undergraduate teaching and supervision of Residents within internal medicine and in providing a referral medicine service at the UVH. Carmel also oversees the Diagnostic Endocrine Service at the UVH and the interpretation of all generated results. Her current research is largely focussed on thyroid function in dogs.

Brendan Corcoran is a native of Dundalk and graduated from the Veterinary College of Ireland in 1981. He has subsequently held posts as a Wellcome Research Leave Fellow, Director of the Hospital for Small Animals and Head of Companion Animal Sciences at Edinburgh. He was awarded a Personal Chair in Veterinary Cardiopulmonary Medicine in 2006 and is currently Director of International Affairs at the R(D)SVS. His clinical and research interests are in respiratory medicine and cardiology and he has published widely in these fields. He is co-author, with fellow Dublin graduate Mike Martin, of Notes on Cardiorespiratory Diseases of the Dog and Cat, which was written with the general practitioner in mind.

SURGERY MODULAR COURSE 2011-2013

Over 3 years, VICAS will deliver an integrated modular course on small animal surgery. Shane Guerin

Shane Guerin qualified in 1986 from UCD, then worked in private practices in Ireland, UK and Australia. He then did a three year small animal surgical residency in Massey University in New Zealand. During this period he did surgical examinations and gained Membership of the Australian College of Veterinary Surgeons and a Diploma in Veterinary Clinical Science. Shane then worked in the Veterinary College Dublin as a Clinical Lecturer from 1996-99. He obtained a Certificate in Orthopaedics from the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons during this time. In 2000 he became a European College Veterinary Surgeon specialist by examination. Shane currently works in private practice in Cork, Ireland which offers a small animal referral service. His special interests include spinal and orthopaedic surgery, with a particular interest in arthroscopy.

Rachel Bennett

Rachel graduated from Cambridge Veterinary School in 1991 and spent a year in small animal practice before starting a residency at the Animal Health Trust in Newmarket in 1993. She obtained the RCVS Certificate in Veterinary Anaesthesia October 1994, then left to take up a residency position at UC Davis, California, USA in 1995. She spent a further four years training in anaesthesia and obtained the Diploma in Veterinary Anaesthesia from the American College of Veterinary Anesthesiologists October 1999. Rachel returned to the UK and worked at the Head Clinical Anaesthetist at the Dept of Veterinary Medicine in Cambridge from 2000-2003. She then became the Lecturer in Veterinary Anaesthesia from 2003-2006. She spent 6 months working at the New Bolton Centre, UPenn, USA from October 2006-April 2007. She worked as the consultant anaesthetist at Newmarket Equine Hospital (formerly Greenwood and Ellis) for two years from June 2007-July 2009. Finally Rachel took the position of Lecturer in Veterinary Anaesthesia at University College Dublin in August 2009.

Overview:

Medical Mystery Tour - exploring the options, exploding the myths

“Join us on this Medical Mystery Tour where we hope to help make medical cases fun instead of frustrating. Entirely through the medium of interactive case studies we will explore the diagnostic approach to many of the important clinical problems that present in small animal practice. We will explore different options in case diagnosis and management as well as explode a few myths about supposed medical ‘truths’. As well as honing your clinical decision making skills and building on the 2010 Logical Clinical Problem Solving course, this entertaining day will explore all manner of key issues in small animal medicine:

- What can a blood count really tell you?
 - Does every patient with azotaemia have renal failure?
 - Is pancreatitis really that difficult to diagnose?
 - Elevated liver enzymes - what do they really mean?
 - Understanding what electrolyte changes mean - fundamental to general practice or leave it to the specialists?
 - Feline hyperthyroidism - how worried should I really be about renal failure and hypertension?
 - Diagnosing hyperadrenocorticism - why can it be so difficult?
 - Cats with diabetes - what are the tricks to getting the diagnosis right and how best to manage them?
 - What’s the best approach to the pet with a chronic cough?
- ...and many more.

Speaker Biographies:

Dr Jill E Maddison BVSc DipVetClinStud
PhD FACVSc MRCVS

Dr. Maddison graduated from the University of Sydney and completed an internship thereafter. Having spent time in private practice she then completed a residency in small animal medicine at the University of

Guelph, Canada. She returned to Australia and completed a PhD on the neurochemistry of Hepatic Encephalopathy at The University of Sydney. She was a senior tutor and clinician in the Department of Veterinary Clinical Sciences from 1987 and from 1990-2000 was a senior lecturer in the Department of Pharmacology. During this time she also worked in general and specialist veterinary practice and was a consultant for a veterinary clinical pathology lab. In 2000 she became the Director of the Veterinary Science Foundation at the University of Sydney.

Jill moved to the UK with her family in April 2001. From 2002 she was a veterinary clinician and lecturer at the Royal Veterinary College, London based at the college’s first opinion practice, the Beaumont Animals’ Hospital, and a Fellow at Girton College, Cambridge where she tutored in pharmacology. In September 2005 she became the Director of Professional Development and head of the CPD Unit at the RVC.

Professor David Church BVSc PhD
MACVSc MRCVS

David graduated with a BVSc from The University of Sydney in 1975. After graduating he was appointed as a small animal clinical instructor at The University of Sydney and then enrolled in a PhD programme in the Faculty of Medicine looking at various aspects of the pathophysiology of diabetes mellitus, completing this in 1983. David was appointed as Lecturer in Small Animal Medicine at The University of Sydney in 1983, promoted to Senior Lecturer in 1991 and Associate Professor in 1999. David obtained membership (small animal medicine) of the Australian College of Veterinary Scientists in 1990, and was Hospital Director of The University Veterinary Centre from 1991 until his departure in 2001 to take up the Chair of Small Animal Studies at the Royal Veterinary College. Soon after his arrival, at the Royal Veterinary College, The Department of Small Animal Medicine and Surgery and the Department of Farm Animal and Equine Medicine and Surgery merged to form the Department of Veterinary Clinical Sciences. David was Head of the new department until August, 2009 and has recently been appointed to Vice Principal (Academic and Clinical Affairs) at the Royal Veterinary College and he is looking forward to the challenges that this new position presents.

Nicola established the first dedicated emergency centre in Ireland, the Dublin Animal Emergency Clinic in 2003. Both come with hands on experience in dealing with emergencies and critically ill cats and dogs and and a background in teaching veterinary students.

Nicola worked from 1982 -1986 at the Calgary Animal Emergency Centre and later from 1993 -1997 at the University of Melbourne Western Animal Emergency Centre and Martin more recently from 2006 at UCD. Martin has finished his PhD in Veterinary Epidemiology in UCD and currently holds a research and teaching position at the School of Veterinary Medicine and Science in the University of Nottingham.

ULTRASOUND WET LABS 1 & 2

Overview:

Ultrasound 1 Wet Lab -
Introductory/Refresher Level

28/6/11 Dogs Trust Dublin 10.00-17.30

This course is aimed at those who are starting off or just getting confident in use of ultrasound. The aim at the end of the day is to be confident in finding and appreciating normal abdominal and thoracic structures.

The tutor will give short lecture and video presentations during the day teaching the theory, each followed by wet labs sessions putting the newly learned skills into practice to find the views and identify and appreciate normal structures.

Ultrasound 2 Wet Lab -
Intermediate/Development Level

6/12/11 Dogs Trust Dublin 10.00-17.30

This course is aimed at those who have been to a previous introductory course for

ultrasound, or who are more experienced in the use of this modality, and who are already confident in their ability to find and see normal structures.

A quick refresher session will be followed by more advanced techniques on how to identify and measure specific organs and functions, and how to differentiate normal from abnormal. The tutor will give short lecture and video presentations during the day teaching the theory, each followed by wet labs sessions putting the newly learned skills into practice.

Speaker Biography:

Alistair Gibson qualified from University College Dublin in 1986. After working in both mixed and small animal practice in England for a period, he returned to Northern Ireland in 1989 where he worked as a partner in the small animal section of a mixed practice in Ballymena, Co. Antrim, developing an interest in small animal cardiology. He left in 2005 to establish a small animal cardiothoracic medical and surgical referral service in Earlswood Veterinary Hospital in Belfast and to set up a Holter monitoring service available to veterinary



surgeons. Alistair's particular areas of interest include small animal cardiothoracic medicine and surgery and diagnostic ultrasound. He is particularly interested in interventional cardiology, thoracoscopy and thoracoscopic surgery. He was one of the first vets in practice in GB and Ireland to perform pacemaker implantation and balloon valvuloplasty procedures in small animals and has lectured widely to both vets and veterinary nurses in Ireland, the UK and Europe on topics related to cardiology and ultrasonography.

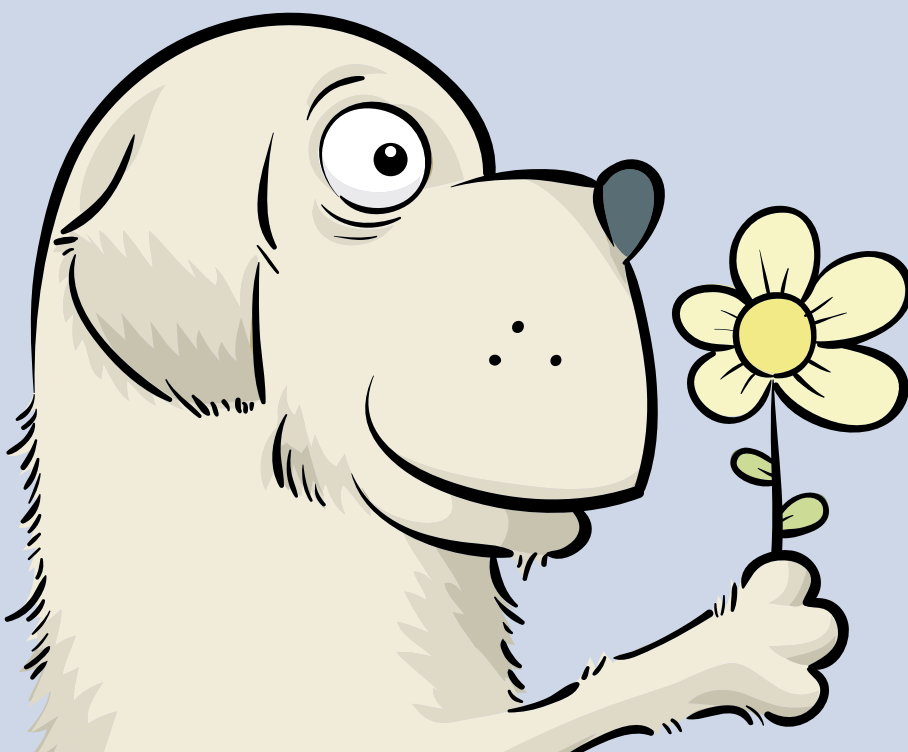
